Discussion: Accountant Doglio stated the budget appropriation ordinance that presented tonight will be open for public inspection for ten days, basically it is all of the funds by department, their revenues and expenditures. We have reviewed all of those line by line. The grand total estimated revenue is \$20,979,483.00 and that across all funds. The grand total of expenditures is \$22,107,405.00 and again that is across all funds. That is utilizing some existing

fund balance in the year as well. Mayor Strong stated that for those of you who werengt here earlier, that \$20 million a lot of that is a pass thru where we get money but we give it out. It not money that the city can use. It sounds like the city gets 20 million dollars to play with, well we dongt. Accountant Doglio added that some of its reimbursable, there is an offset to it. Mayor Strong stated that the South Arsenal they are doing work out there well the government gives us money and we turn around and give it to the guy who doing the work. Same thing Peotone road we fix that we get money coming. Then out at Ridge, we get money for taxes and got to turn around and give it back, that 5 million, which we can use. No other public comment was made.

### Mayor's Report

Mayor Strong announced the City fireworks on June 30 at the North Island at dusk, Rotary car show downtown on June 30, CMAP downtown plan open house June 26 at island park district 4:30 to 6:30, Lion Club annual fishing derby June 23 at the South Island pond 4-6:30. Also the west side of town is picking up pretty good-The car museum at the old Ben Franklin is going to have a grand opening soon, the Crichton bothers (Factory to U) have been bought and there is going to be a workout place there. Next to Burger King the construction of a new storage facility may start soon. Bill Weidlings mom passed away last week. Downtown we got the two buildings that have been improved. Mayor Strong introduced Jake Tenn, Ben Dietz and Zack Kavanaugh. They thanked John Persic for the mulch for the South Island which was spread out on the playground this afternoon. Mayor Strong stated that the City appreciates what they are doing. Alderman Tutor asked what group these gentlemen are with? Jake Tenn stated that they dongt have an official name but they went under Rock Your Block when we beautified Northcrest Park. Mr. Tenn stated that they had a really good turnout, probably about 50 adults and some kids then we had a party a week after which had about 100 people there. And now we want to beautify the South Island, so we are going to be doing fundraisers and stuff like that. The Council thanked them for all the work theyeve done. Jake Tenn stated that they are looking at the other playground by the ball park. There are some safety issues there. We would like to mulch and put barriers and stuff like that. Mayor Strong stated that we are going to start working on that bathroom on the north island; we need all the help we can get on that. We will find projects that can help out the community.

### **Public Comment**

Jeannie Walsh, who lives on Cottage Road, voiced her complaints about Ridgeport Logistics. Her and her sister worked together with the Swift Transportation Company to get the GPS fixed which took a couple months. Now trucks are still coming down Cottage Road, lost. She talks about putting names of Companyøs on the signs going into Ridgeport. She also wants the City to work with the State to put up billboards up on Exit 240 because the trucks are not stopping on the ramps. She talked to the state police and they said that putting stop lights up on the ramp is

now being reviewed. Ms. Walsh thinks it would be a good idea to put flashing yellow lights on the signs to call the truckers attention to the correct location instead of going the wrong way and destroying peoplesø yards and driveways. Jeannie Walsh questioned whether land was sold to become a truck terminal. There was an itty-bitty sign saying the land was for sale. The sign only had a phone number. When she called she found out they are putting in a truck terminal on 8 acres. Samual Annyon Say Trucking Incorporated said there will be about 15 to 20 more semiøs there and 4,500 square foot structure proposed. Its passed by Will County already. Over the tracks on the left, west of the tracks.

# **Resolution No. 2018-10**

# A Resolution By the City of Wilmington City Council in support of the designation of Route 66 as a National Historic Trail

- WHEREAS, Route 66 was our nation first all-paved U.S. Highway System connecting the Midwest to California. In the 1930s, it was the oroad to opportunity for hundreds of thousands of Americans escaping the devastation of the Dust Bowl, and provided thousands of jobs on road crews for workers who had were unemployed during the Great Depression; and
- WHEREAS, Throughout World War II, critical troops, equipment and supplies were transported on Route 66 to military bases across the country. After the war ended, thousands of troops traveled Route 66 back home to their families and independence; and
- **WHEREAS**, upon the replacement of Route 66 by the Interstate System, which led to its decommissioning in 1985, resulted in economic hardship for these local businesses that thrived on providing services to the Route 66 traveler; and
- WHEREAS, Route 66 has become an iconic symbol of American search for freedom, adventure, and prosperity which annually brings travelers from around the world who use it to discover America; and
- **WHEREAS,** a *Special Resources Study* completed by the National Park Service has determined that Route 66 meets all the criteria for federal designation as a National Historic Trail; and
- **WHEREAS**, the designation of Route 66 as a permanent National Historic Trail could have a significant economic impact in the eight states along the route and help spur preservation efforts; and
- WHEREAS, Route 66 would be the first National Historic Trail to celebrate motorized travel and America love affair with the automobile; and
- WHEREAS, Congress recognized the importance of the road by establishing the National Park Service Rt. 66 Corridor Preservation Program in the National Trails Office in 1999 to foster preservation, economic development and marketing through matching grants, which has leveraged more than \$4 million in historic preservation investment; and
- WHEREAS, in addition to its historic significance, Route 66 has proven itself a major economic force for the communities it passes through. Designation as a National Historic Trail will help to increase the economic impact of Route 66 in hundreds of communities.

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# H.R. 801: A Bill to Designate Route 66 as a National Historic Trail FAQ

## 1) What is a National Historic Trail?

National Historic Trails (NHTs) are travel routes that were originally established by historic use. They have been determined to be of national significance because of that use, meet the criteria under the National Trails System Act (NTSA), and have been designated by Congress through an amendment to the NTSA.

# 2) What is HR801?

In February 1, 2017, Rep. Darin LaHood (R-IL) introduced HR801 to designate Route 66 as a National Historic Trail administered by the National Park Service (NPS). This new designation is important because the Route 66 Corridor Preservation Program is scheduled to sunset on September 30, 2019. The NHT would provide a permanent federal designation to support efforts to preserve and promote the idiosyncratic nature (i.e. quirky, unique elements) of Route 66 through partnerships with the NPS.

3) How can Route 66 be a National Historic Trail if it has paved roads instead of trails? Many historic trails followed the roads of the day, but they were not paved. Commonly, "historic trails" followed earlier American Indian travel routes. In some cases travelers forged new routes and created the trail. The Santa Fe "Trail," during its historic period, was called a "road" or a "camino." The Selma to Montgomery National Historic Trail is entirely on paved roads. Route 66 would commemorate modern motorized traffic and the history of modern road development during the period of significance (1926-1985) including pavement, gas stations, motels, etc.

# 4) Does Route 66 meet the National Historic Trail designation criteria?

Yes. The National Park Service *Route 66 Special Resource Study* (1995) determined it does meet the National Historic Trail criteria and this is one of the first steps in establishing a National Historic Trail.

# 5) How many other National Historic Trails are there, and how do they compare to Route 66?

There are 19 NHTs across the country ranging in length from 54 to 5,665 miles. All Route 66 states have other existing NHTs. Route 66 has many similarities to the other long distance historic transportation routes that are National Historic Trails, though Route 66 is the only one that would commemorate modern motorized traffic.

- **6) Does the NHT designation mean that the NPS is "taking over" Route 66?** Absolutely not.
  - A) Will this affect private property right? No. Trail designation does not give the NPS any authority over lands not owned by the NPS. Landowners along the route retain all legal authority to manage their property, and there are no restrictions placed on business owners. Property owners who want to participate in NHT programs can choose to sign a non-binding agreement to work with the NPS and others towards the goals of the trail, but they retain the right to cancel that agreement at any time.
  - B) Can the Route 66 NHT acquire land or buildings along the route?

    Like other NHT legislation, HR801 allows the NPS to acquire land with landowner consent. HR801 specifically prohibits the use of eminent domain to acquire property. As Route 66 consists of roads that are already a public right of way there is no need for land acquisition. Since 1978 when the NHTs were established, land acquisition has been used twice (with landowner consent) to protect endangered historic resources.
  - c) Would HR801 create new restrictions or requirements for government entities?

No, the NHT designation does not add any new burdens or requirements for government entities. There are no additional federal restrictions or regulations beyond those that are already in place.

# 7) What are the benefits of becoming a National Historic Trail?

This permanent federal designation provides national recognition for Route 66. It allows partners on the road to obtain technical and financial assistance from the National Park Service for preservation, interpretation, signage, promotion, research and other efforts related to eligible historic resources through cooperative agreements, subject to the availability of funding. Cooperative agreements are different from grants because the federal agency is an active partner in the project rather than just the grant-making entity.

# **ORDINANCE NO. 18-07-03-01**

# AN ORDINANCE APPROPRIATING FOR ALL CORPORATE PURPOSES FOR THE CITY OF WILMINGTON, WILL COUNTY, ILLINOIS, FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING MAY 1, 2018 AND ENDING APRIL 30, 2019

**BE IT ORDAINED** BY THE MAYOR AND THE CITY ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF WILMINGTON, WILL COUNTY, ILLINOIS:

- **SECTION 1 APPROPRIATION** ó That the amount hereinafter set forth, or so much thereof as may be authorized by law, and as may be needed or deemed necessary to defray all expenses and liabilities of the municipality be and the same are hereby appropriated for the corporate purposes of the city of Wilmington, Will County, Illinois, as hereinafter specified for the fiscal year beginning May 1, 2018 and ending April 30, 2019.
- **SECTION 2 APPROPRIATION AND MAXIMUM AMOUNTS** ó That the appropriation herein made for any purposes shall be regarded as the maximum amounts to be expended under the respective appropriation accounts and shall not be construed as a commitment, agreement, obligation or liability of the City of Wilmington, and such appropriation begin subject to further approval as to expenditure thereof by the City Council.
- **SECTION 3 APPROPRIATION: OBJECTS AND PURPOSES** ó That the amount appropriated for each object and purpose, shall be as follows:
- **SECTION 4 FILING WITH THE COUNTY CLERK** ó That the Clerk of the City of Wilmington shall file certified copies of the Ordinance with the County Clerk of Will County, Illinois, within thirty (30) days after its adoption.
- **SECTION 5 REPEALER** ó All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict with any of the provision of the ordinance shall be, and the same are hereby repealed.
- **SECTION 6 SEVERABILITY –** This Ordinance and every provision thereof, shall be considered severable. In the event that any court of competent jurisdiction may find and declare sentence, paragraph, provision, or section of this Ordinance is void or unconstitutional, the remaining words, phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs and provisions and parts of phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs, provisions and sections not ruled void or unconstitutional shall continue in full force and effect.
- **SECTION 7 EFFECTIVE DATE** ó This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication in pamphlet form as provided by law.

# CITY OF WILMINGTON NON-BINDING LETTER OF INTENT TO ACQUIRE EASEMENT

Subject to final approval of a mutually agreeable Easement Agreement by the Corporate Authorities of the City of Wilmington and the owners of record, and the agreement of the owner of the benefitted property to pay all costs and expenses, the City hereby expresses its intent to acquire an Easement Agreement with the owners of record of parcel 03-17-09-300-019-0000 for the easements identified in the attached Exhibit A (Exhibit A depicts a 50-foot permanent easement and 150-foot temporary easement and is representative only and the owners of record reserve the right to review and approve the final easement and engineering drawings) subject to the terms substantially as follows:

- 1. A payment to the owners of record of parcel 03-17-09-300-019-0000 in the amount of \$175,000.00 plus legal and professional fees.
- 2. The grant of easement shall allow for the drainage of storm water from the õBenefited Propertyö which shall be identified as any 700 acres south of the north right of way of Lorenzo Road, which may discharge directly or indirectly onto, through, or under the owner of recordøs property by pipe, swale, or otherwise. Property to be benefitted shall be identified by a map showing the acreage.
- 3. The grant of easement shall provide for and allow up to an additional 580 acres to be added to the Benefitted Property upon a one-time payment to the owners of record of parcel 03-17-09-300-019-0000 in an amount equal to \$300.00 per added acre which may be able to use the outfall pipe capacity beyond the original acres identified as the Benefitted Property. After 10 years from the date of the Easement Agreement, the City shall make a one-time payment of \$10,000.00 in order to keep open the option of adding acreage and the per acre one-time payment for additional acreage would be increased to \$400.00 per acre. The City shall identify the Benefitted Property and additional benefitted property prior to the inclusion of said property as benefitted. No acreage shall be added after 20 years from the date of the Easement Agreement, unless a new agreement has been established between these two parties.
- 4. For the East 25 feet of the permanent easement the Illinois Department of Agriculture (IDOA) requirements for pipe installation and depth shall be followed and all manhole lids shall be located and buried within the permanent easement and below plow level at a depth to be specified in the Easement Agreement. Specific details of the installation shall include ground decompaction, topsoil separation, regrading, deep disking and deep ripping, trench dig vs open area all in compliance with IDOA Pipe Installation Guidelines, as well as the City of Wilmington® Construction Standards. Should there be a conflict between the two (2) standards, the more stringent shall apply. The easement will incorporate terms from an IDOA Agricultural Mitigation Agreement used for pipeline projects. The west 25 feet of the permanent easement shall contain an 8ø wide gravel drive and if the pipe is under the west 25 feet the depth shall be sufficient for farm equipment to travel on the gravel road. The drive shall have a locked gate with õ*Private Property, No Trespassing*ö signs, and shall have a new culvert and paved field entrance from the property boundary to the edge of pavement for Lorenzo Rd.

- 5. The City of Wilmington warrants that it owns Old Lorenzo Road pursuant to an executed Jurisdictional Transfer Agreement.
- 6. The City of Wilmington shall provide one paved access drive from the property boundary to the edge of pavement with culvert west of Kavanaugh Road along with overhead utility relocations to allow for access of farm equipment.
- 7. The City of Wilmington shall provide an East/West access with a culvert on the north end of the permanent easement to provide for farm equipment access across the permanent easement.
- 8. The City of Wilmington shall be responsible for maintenance of and soil erosion control within the current drainage ditch upon acceptance of a mutually agreeable grant of easement from the owner of record. These terms to be incorporated into the Easement Agreement.
- 9. The City of Wilmington shall be responsible for any crop damage caused by the construction of the outfall pipe and maintenance operations. Upon development of mutually agreeable language the City would agree to be responsible for future yield loss and input costs attributable to the City construction and use of the easement.
- 10. The City of Wilmington shall design the Outflow for erosion control and shall indemnify the owner of record for any damages to the BNSF drainage area/outfall. The City shall obtain permit/approval from BNSF for the proposed outflow. The City shall submit design details and calculations to and obtain approval from the BNSF that show that there will be no adverse impact to the railroad property. City shall indemnify and defend the owner of record if the railroad has any claims or future demands in regards to the drainage outflow caused by the Cityøs maintenance of and soil erosion control within the current drainage ditch or are a result of the Cityøs use of the easements.
- 11. The City of Wilmington shall provide a General Indemnification and Hold Harmless clause for the owner of record and agents for any matter related to the grant of easements. The City shall covenant that its construction, operation and maintenance of the storm water pipes and the current drainage ditch shall at all times be in accordance with applicable local, state and federal laws, rules and regulations.
- 12. The City of Wilmington shall allow continued use of farm access on Lorenzo Road for the owner of records easternmost parcel. The City shall provide a paved access drive from right of way to edge of pavement with culvert onto Old Lorenzo Road for access to the owner of records easternmost parcel.
- 13. The Temporary Easement shall be for a two (2) year period commencing on the date of the receipt by the City of the Easement executed by the owner of record.
- 14. The City of Wilmington has installed and shall maintain a video detector during the installation of the traffic signals on Graaskamp Blvd to enable a left-hand turn onto Lorenzo when the intersection is improved.

- 15. Pipe(s) shall be reinforced concrete (RCP) and the size of the pipes shall be determined based on the approved design of the storm sewer. All pipes shall be owned by the City.
- 16. The City of Wilmington shall be responsible for the removal of trees and brush within the easements. As part of the final engineering design plant material will be identified for removal and the City will be responsible for the removal of the debris as agreed upon by all parties.
- 17. The City of Wilmington shall have installed a 10 inch diameter ADS field drainage pipe east of the RCP storm drainage pipe which shall be connected to all existing field tiles that are crossed which were identified by the Field Tile Study or are cut during the installation of the storm sewer. Any future drainage tiles can also be tied to the ADS field drainage pipe. The City will allow for identified existing field tiles to be connected to the 10ö ADS field drainage pipe. The property owner will be responsible for future maintenance for this field tile drainage system and the City will allow access to the property owner for maintenance and any future field tile connections which will be allowed. The field tile will be owned by the property owner of record after the installation is completed as part of this project.
- 18. The City of Wilmington shall provide and install sleeves for sewer and water under Lorenzo Road near the Graascamp Road/Lorenzo Road intersection when services are requested by the property owner.
- 19. The City of Wilmington/owner of Benefitted Property shall provide sufficient security in the form of a letter of credit to ensure completion of items which are the responsibility of the City pursuant to the Easement Agreement.
- 20. Combined storm water discharge onto, through, or under the owner of recordøs property from the Benefitted Property or additional benefitted property (into pipes, existing swales or otherwise) shall not be greater than 0.04 cfs/acre for the two-year, 24-hour storm and not greater than 0.15cfs/acre for the 100-year, 24 hour storm. Any storm event up to and including the 500 year critical duration storm shall not exceed the combined capacity of the pipes and existing swales.
- 21. The City shall periodically provide the owner of record with notice as Benefitted Property or additional benefitted property is included and said notice shall include a map defining the area, along with the acreage to be included and a running total of all acres that have been included.
- 22. Mutual obligations of the parties shall be contained in the written Easement Agreement. The Easement Agreement is subject to the approval of the Corporate Authorities of the City and the owners of record. This letter of intent is non-binding on the parties.
- 23. The Easement Agreement will contain an attorney fee provision in favor of the owner of record in the event of a breach by the City.
- 24. Adar Ridgeport Industrial Partners, LLC shall be, and is hereby authorized to act as, the Cityøs agent for negotiating and preparing the Easement Agreement.

25. This non-binding Letter of Intent is open for one (1) year from the date of execution.
